### **Kim's Book Honored**

<u>Curative Violence: Rehabilitating Disability, Gender, and Sexuality in Modern Korea</u>, a book by **Eunjung Kim** (Cultural Foundations of Education, dual faculty in Arts & Sciences), was named the 2017 Alison Piepmeier Award Winner by the <u>National Women's Studies Association</u>. The award honors "groundbreaking monographs that make significant contributions to feminist disability studies scholarship." Described as "brilliant and necessary," Kim's book will be recognized at NWSA's annual conference in November.

#### **Heffernan Garners NIH Grant**

**Kevin Heffernan** (Exercise Science) is the principal investigator for "Racial Differences in Arterial Stiffness and Cognitive Function," an R03 award of \$150,000 over two years from the National Institute on Minority Health and Health Disparities sponsored by the National Institutes of Health (NIH). **Tiago Barreira** (ES) will also serve the project as a statistician. As ES chair **Tom Brutsaert** explains, NIH is "top of the heap" funding that comes with "considerable prestige" for researchers in the health sciences.

- **Marcelle Haddix** (Reading & Language Arts): <u>2017 Judith Greenberg Seinfeld Scholar Award</u>, intended to recognize "those who have made an outstanding contribution to the beauty of the world, who have added to human values and to ending human abuse anywhere in the world."

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### **Stone Wins Dissertation Award**

Where No Place is Home: Understanding Rural Students in Higher Education by **Ashley Stone** (Higher Education) was selected as the 2017 Dissertation of the Year by the Research and Assessment Committee of the <u>Southern Association for</u> <u>College Student Affairs (SACSA)</u>. Stone will present her work at the SACSA conference in Chattanooga, Tennessee.

### **Robertson Co-Authors New Volume**

The University of Chicago Press recently released <u>The Case for Contention: Teaching Controversial Issues in American</u> <u>Schools</u>, co-authored by Jonathan Zimmerman and **Emily Robertson** (CFE), faculty emerita and a former interim dean of the School of Education. Grounded in history and philosophy, the book argues for the central role of the educational system in improving civic debate and overcoming political impasses.
